COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a university-level course designed for undergraduates that explores the postmortal ministry of Jesus Christ and the growth and development of the early church as detailed in the second half of the New Testament (i.e. Acts to Revelation). It will be a text-based class that will survey the New Testament books from Acts to Revelation doctrinally, spiritually, and historically (cf. D&C 88:118; 109:7).

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. The primary purpose of this course is to help students gain a stronger testimony of Jesus Christ and his role in the Plan of Salvation, and experience an increase in their commitment to discipleship as they are better able to understand, contextualize, and apply the scriptural teachings about Jesus.
- 2. To accomplish the first objective, the content of this course will provide an analysis of key scriptural texts—drawn principally from Acts through Revelation—that teach about the mission of Jesus Christ and how his early followers understood and bore testimony of his salvific work.
- 3. As a necessary part of this process, students will learn essential skills of scripture study that will allow them to effectively understand and responsibly apply scriptures to their own life. For each scriptural text studied, these skills will include an understanding of the meaning and interpretation of the text, and where appropriate, how Restoration scripture provides unique doctrinal clarity to the texts being discussed. Additional skills will include the ability to recognize and avoid scriptural "proof-texting" or "cherry-picking" (i.e. taking single verses of scripture out of context). These skills will help students form life-long habits of in-depth scripture study and will help them to more powerfully integrate the teachings of the scriptures into their daily lives. In today's world Latter-day Saint students must be more scripturally literate and more committed to a life of discipleship than their predecessors.

REQUIRED TEXTS: Standard Works (KJV Bible; B of M; D & C; P of GP)

- It is essential that students bring their scriptures to every class. It is preferable that students bring hard copies of scriptures instead of electronic versions.

Exams

All exams will be completed online via Learning Suite. Exams are timed and consist of multiple-choice questions, short answer questions, and a short essay question. Study information for exams can be accessed on course website under "Study Guides." It is recommended that students print off study guides well in advance of the exam and use it to guide their studies for the exam. The exams are not cumulative but only cover the unit which they immediately follow. Failure to write an exam during the scheduled block will result in a 0 grade. Quizzes

There will be six <u>online quizzes</u> during the semester. Online quizzes will be available during the dates and times listed below. It is the student's responsibility to log into Learning Suite and take the quiz during this time. Failure to take a quiz during this period will result in a 0 grade for the quiz. Online quizzes consist of between 20 and 25 multiple choice questions (A - D) and once started students are given 30 min to complete. Online quizzes are open book (class notes and scriptures etc.) but students must complete on their own without any collaboration with other students. Each quiz is worth 3% of the total grade. Online quizzes can cover anything covered from the beginning of a unit until the date the quiz is given.

Reflection Paper

Each student will write a 3–4 page (double spaced paper; 12 pt font; Times New Roman) that will include a cover page (not counted toward page count; cover page will include title, name, and section). Students will use the scriptures, personal experience and insights to address the following question:

"based on your study of the Pauline epistles this semester, what attribute of discipleship do you most want to nurture, grow, and enhance?" As Paul discuses numerous attributes of discipleship (i.e. faith, charity, good works, gifts of the spirit [of which there are many], etc.) you should have no problem settling on a single attribute. As part of your paper include a discussion of what Paul says about this attribute as well as how this applies to you and your efforts to become a better disciple of Christ. Since this is a reflection paper, students may use the first-person pronoun "I" throughout. **Due date:** <u>Wed.</u> **Apr. 13 (hardcopy is due at the start of class; paper must be stapled)**.

Homework/Participation Assessment

On Learning Suite access the "Homework/Participation Assessment," fill out, assign yourself a grade, and have this completed by the start of class period on the assigned date. Failure to complete assessment before class period on assigned date will result in 20% deduction. For each additional day another 15% will be deducted. Students will self-assess as to how they completed the homework, principally readings, during the course of the semester. If students fail to score themselves as per the instructions they will receive a 0 grade on the assignment. **Due by:** Mon. Apr. 11 by 11:00 am. This assignment will open on Learning Suite on Mon. Apr. 4 at 8:00 am.

Attendance

Attendance is taken every class period after the add/drop date by passing around a class-list for students to sign. It is your responsibility to make sure that you sign your name before you leave each class period. Failure to sign the list on any particular day will count as an absence, even if you were present. DO NOT SIGN IN FOR ANOTHER STUDENT! If you come to class, sign the attendance roll, and then leave before class is finished your attendance will not be counted for the day. You are permitted 2 unexcused absence during the semester. For each subsequent unexcused absence your final grade will be lowered 2% per absence. **After 8 unexcused absences you fail the course**.

GRADING SCALE

The following scale is based on total percentages required to obtain the listed grades. It is possible that based on overall class performance, schedule changes, or other factors the scale may vary from what is shown below, but any variation would always be in the student's advantage. *In no way should the grading of a religion class be considered an evaluation of one's testimony or sincerity*. While testimonies should be strengthened by a serious study and discussion of the scriptures, students are evaluated on their mastery of the material covered in class.

CLASSROOM EXPERIENCE

Both scriptural knowledge and spiritual experience are important. This class is as much about becoming scriptorians as it is about strengthening your testimony and applying principles to your life. The philosophy of this class is that we will invite the Holy Spirit through prayer and then feel its influence by diligent, faithful, and prayerful study and discussion. After prayer and a possible pop quiz, the remainder of class time will be used for reading key scriptural passages and for discussing the history, stories, and teachings in the scriptures. As your teacher, I will share insights from the

historical background, cross-references from other scriptures, teachings from modern prophets/apostles, personal experiences/testimony, and application for daily living. As a class member, you should feel free and confident to raise your hand to ask questions and/or share your own brief testimony, insights, or applications.

CLASS ETIQUETTE & POLICIES

It is expected that students will come to class on time and will have completed the assigned readings so that they might be prepared to actively participate in class. Students anticipating a class absence should find a classmate willing to loan his/her notes; no lecture notes will be available from the instructor. Disruptive behavior including multiple tardies, cell phone interruption or use (including text messaging), sleeping, and/or other disruptions (talking during class discussion and lectures, reading newspapers) will not be tolerated and may result in a lower grade. If you bring a lap-top computer to class, disruptive behavior also includes playing video games, writing or reading email, and surfing the internet. You will get far more out of this course if you resist the urge to multi-task during class.
