A MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBI

Looking to the Horizon: Mission, Vision, and Our Sacred Future

One of the most stirring commands in the Torah appears in *Parashat Shoftim: "Tzedek, tzedek tirdof—Justice, justice shall you pursue."* Three short Hebrew words that have shaped Jewish thought and action for generations.

The doubling of the word *tzedek* immediately caught the attention of our sages. Torah is economical

with language, so the repetition must be intentional. One interpretation teaches that justice must be pursued through just means; we cannot achieve noble goals by compromising our values. Another interpretation suggests

that justice is not a one-time accomplishment but a lifelong pursuit—it requires persistence, humility, and constant renewal.

A third interpretation looks inward, teaching that the command addresses two realms of justice: the justice we pursue in the wider world and the justice we cultivate within ourselves and our communities. This dimension feels especially resonant for us at Congregation Beth Emeth.

Outwardly, our community is deeply committed to *tzedek*. Many of you volunteer in the region, support organizations that serve the vulnerable, and show up when our neighbors are in need. This outward-facing justice work is part of what makes Beth Emeth such a proud and principled presence in the Capital Region.

But the Torah also calls us to look inward—toward

justice within our own gates. What does the pursuit of tzedek look like inside our congregation? It looks like creating a culture where every person feels seen, valued, and welcomed. It looks like speaking with kindness even across

disagreements, showing patience when tensions arise, and grounding our decisions in integrity. It means striving for transparency, shared responsibility, and trust as we shape the future of Jewish life in Albany.

This inner pursuit of justice is quieter than public activism. It does not come with headlines or rallies. But it is no less sacred. Judaism teaches that justice begins not only in the public square but at home—in our relationships, our institutions, and our daily interactions.

As we continue our cultural and communal work at Beth Emeth—strengthening a mission-centered understanding of giving, deepening learning and prayer, caring for congregants across life stages—I see the words *tzedek*, *tzedek tirdof* offering powerful guidance.

Moving from a person-centered culture of giving to a community-centered one is, at its core, a pursuit of justice. It affirms that our synagogue belongs to all of us, across generations. It reminds us that sustaining Jewish life is a shared responsibility—not held by a few, but carried collectively. Generosity takes many forms: showing up, volunteering, supporting programs,

welcoming newcomers, lending a hand, and giving financially when we can. All of this is *tzedek*.

The pursuit of justice also shapes how we talk with one another about our hopes and concerns for Beth Emeth. It means listening deeply, acknowledging different experiences, and remaining anchored in compassion even when we disagree. Judaism does not mandate unanimity; it calls us to argue with respect and love.

In this season, as winter invites reflection and renewal, the Torah's words provide a spiritual compass. They ask us to consider:

- What injustices in the world am I being called to address?
- What relationships in my life need healing or greater understanding?
- How can I help make Beth Emeth an even more just, compassionate, and mission-driven community?
- Where in my daily life can I pursue justice with more intention?

Often the pursuit of *tzedek* is not dramatic. It can be as small—and as profound—as showing up for someone who is grieving, offering support to a family in need, or choosing empathy in a tense moment. It looks like helping a child feel confident in Hebrew school, checking in on an older member, or celebrating a teen stepping into Jewish adulthood. These small acts do not make headlines, but they build the world we want to live in.

Our tradition teaches that we are not expected to finish the work, but neither are we free to turn away

from it. Justice is a shared, ongoing, sacred pursuit—one that shapes who we are and the community we strive to be.

My blessing for us in the months ahead is this: may we hear the doubled call of *tzedek* as an invitation and a guide. May we act with courage in the world and with compassion at home. And may our synagogue continue to be a place where justice is not only taught, but lived.

As we move into the holiday season, I want to wish each of you a happy, healthy, and safe time with the people you love. May the New Year bring moments of joy, peace, and renewed strength for all of us.

Thank you for walking with me. Thank you for lifting me. Thank you for being the kind of community that turns sorrow into strength simply by showing up.

May we continue to care for one another in this same spirit because, as you have shown me, community is not something we belong to; it is something we build together, moment by moment, act by act, heart by heart.

Although this bulletin will arrive in your mailbox at the beginning of 2026, as I write this, I haven't yet completed three weeks at Congregation Beth Emeth.

And yet, in this short time, I've already experienced such a wide range of moments that speak deeply to the heart of this community.

In this short time, I've seen again and again what makes this community so special: generosity, purpose, and warmth. These qualities shine through in the way we worship, learn, celebrate, volunteer, and care for one another. They show up in quiet conversations after services, in the laughter of students arriving for religious school, and in the countless small acts of kindness that happen here every single day.

On Wednesday afternoons, the building hums with the sound of children heading to religious school. Their energy fills the halls, and it's impossible not to smile. It's a real point of pride to be part of a congregation that invests so deeply in nurturing the next generation.

At a time when food insecurity in the Capital Region is so visible and urgent, I've been amazed by the scope and impact of our Soup Kitchen — and by the dedication of the volunteers who have kept it going for forty years. Together we exceeded the fundraising goal for the second annual Wisely Dupiche Turkey Give-Away in just days! By the time you read this, 75 turkeys will have been delivered to local families, along with pans and spices to make a proper feast (courtesy of the Sisterhood). The generosity of this community is inspiring.

One of my first experiences here was participating in the funeral service for a beloved member of the congregation. Even in the sadness of that moment, I found it deeply moving to observe how our members surrounded the family with love and care—how people showed up not only with words, but simply by being present. It reminded me that community is built not just in moments of joy, but also in times of loss and vulnerability. Standing together in grief is one of the most essential expressions of who we are as humans.

And then, last night, I found myself humming along to camp songs at the Hootenanny Watch Party, surrounded by laughter and stories from summers at Crane Lake Camp and Camp Eisner. It didn't matter who knew all the words or how long it had been since they'd last sung them—the spirit of fun and togetherness in that room transcended generations.

I'm so grateful to everyone who's taken the time to welcome me—to share your Beth Emeth stories, your hopes, and your love for this congregation and the people in it. Every conversation helps me understand a little more about what makes this place so special and how I can best serve and support our shared journey.

As we move forward into a new year, I look forward to many more moments together—of reflection and celebration, of learning and laughter, of building an ever-stronger, ever-more-inclusive community focused on Beth Emeth's bright future.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Learning and practicing fairness, kindness, and standing up for what's right are topics that are taught in all schools everywhere, and they sound like complicated lessons. But here however, at the Einhorn Center for Jewish Education, these are the cornerstones of our work. Through classroom lessons, routines, activities, and relationships, we work hard to practice being fair and standing up for what is morally right, teaching, and living these values for our students to see for themselves.

How, you may wonder?

With students as young as toddlers in our Discovery Room (our playroom) where children learn to share and take turns and in school-age classrooms, we ensure everyone is included. We adults do our best to model these behaviors, too, by admitting our mistakes and apologizing when necessary. And as a first year principal, I've had to do a lot of that!

We stand up for others by talking to a trusted adult when something seems amiss or unfair. This behavior is a norm in our school because our teachers work hard to build relationships with their students and their parents, so everyone feels safe and supported. And at the Einhorn Center, we work to build a love of Judaism, so that students will learn to stand up for Jews in every place they travel.

We practice empathy by listening to others' feelings and stories, trying to understand what someone else is going through, and trying to understand what it's like to walk in others' shoes. Our 6th graders spend the year learning about both American Jewish history and Holocaust history, and much of this is taught through video testimony. Our 7th graders are spending the year in preparation for B'nai Mitzvah and learning pre-leadership skills so that they can give back to our school and community once they have reached the milestone of becoming a Jewish adult.

We look to find ways for students to help others in the greater community. Whether that's making tactile Chanukah cards for Jews who are blind, or our Jr Choir singing at Avila for folks who might not get visitors, learning about recycling and taking care of the Earth, or working at the Soup Kitchen, even the smallest hands can make a difference.

All of these activities build confidence and teach that practicing justice involves courage and responsibility. We're so proud of the mensches we get to teach weekly, and appreciative of our families supporting this work!

Because of these deep-rooted bonds, I was truly humbled when asked to chair the search committee for our next Cantor.

Our Committee and Mission

Our search committee is a diverse group of congregants. Each member is a thoughtful, informed individual who understands the gravity of this responsibility.

I am honored to work alongside **Garry Sanders, Karen Kaufman-White, Josie Kivort, David Lieberman, Adam Mandel, Poppy Eisenberg, Robin Sobol, and Rabbi Greg Weitzman.**Together, our mission is to identify a Cantor who will honor our rich traditions while helping to lead Beth Emeth into a vibrant future.

The Search Process

Identifying the right leader is a delicate and complex undertaking. We have already reached several key milestones:

- **Application Submission:** Our formal request for a new Cantor has been submitted to the American Conference of Cantors (ACC).
- Candidate Review: We have received several applications and are currently in the process
 of narrowing the field.
- **Consultation:** The committee has met frequently to align on the specific needs and aspirations of our congregation.

The coming winter and spring will be an intensive period for our team. Following initial committee interviews, our top finalists will visit Albany for a final round of evaluations.

Looking Ahead

Our ultimate goal is to select an exceptional Cantor to welcome into the Beth Emeth family by **July**1. We are committed to a process that is as rigorous as it is respectful of our community's history.

BROTHERHOOD: WHERE COMMUNITY COMES TO LIFE

Schmooze with us!

Thanks to our Brotherhood member Stephen Weitzman, we've added a new event on our monthly Brotherhood calendar. We are now meeting in the evening once a month to exchange ideas on current Torah topics, connecting, and sharing as we learn and debate that month's topic.

Each month, we will gather for a relaxed and meaningful "Torah Schmooze" — a chance to connect over coffee, camaraderie, and conversation rooted in Jewish wisdom. Whether you're a seasoned scholar or just Torah-curious, come share insights, ask questions, and enjoy the spirit of brotherhood. No preparation needed, just bring your curiosity and a good sense of humor!

Our first Brotherhood Torah Schmooze in November revolved around "What is it to be Jewish?"

I can't read or write Hebrew; I never study Torah and I rarely go to temple. I wear a Jewish star and eat a bagel and lox or a brisket sandwich religiously. I'm Jewish. Or am I? What does it mean to be Jewish? Is Jewish identity an accident of birth? Is it culinary? Is it cultural? Or, is there an action required in order to be Jewish? We discussed how the Torah, Rabbinic sages like Maimonides and Rashi, and 21st century traditional and Reform Rabbis have defined Jewish identity.

Our second Brotherhood Schmooze in December discussed Chanukah.

Ask anyone to tell you how Chanukah began or why we celebrate for eight days and they are sure to tell you of a sacred jar of oil, 8 nights of miracles (and possibly presents), a few battles, and a temple cleansing. But, for all intents and purposes, this was not the case. We put another light on Chanukah as we discussed how it has been viewed by Jews over thousands of years, why the Talmudic Rabbis asked "What is Chanukah" (that it should even be celebrated); why it has become a popular major holiday in America; and what Chanukah's significance is for all Jews in the 21st century.

We hope you will join us for our Monthly call as we gather to learn, share our thoughts and opinions, and connect with each other. No prior Torah Study experience or advanced Jewish knowledge is necessary.

FROM THE ARCHIVES...

100 years ago From Rabbi Emeritus Scott Shpeen

Two articles that appeared in the **TIMES UNION** during the winter months of 1926 are of particular note pertaining to Congregation Beth Emeth.

The first is an article about a terrible fire that ravaged Calvary Baptist Church and displaced that congregation. As was done at other times when Trinity United Methodist Church, Westminster Presbyterian Church, and The First Unitarian Society all suffered fires, Beth Emeth opened the doors of the Temple downtown so that Calvary Baptist Church could use our sanctuary to conduct their Sunday morning services beginning in March of 1926.





The second article was a **FULL PAGE AD** taken in the newspaper underwritten by "men and women who believe that if this country is to meet successfully the problems confronting it to-day, there must be, first of all, a greater recognition of the spiritual side of life." The bulk of the page was an article written by Congregation Beth Emeth Rabbi Marius Ranson entitled, "GO TO CHURCH AND PRAY:

A PSYCHOLOGICAL ANALYSIS" and he specifically mentions that "It is therefore natural and highly essential that we worship together, for the highest plane of religious feeling cannot be realized save in social prayer...".

The article and his poignant words still ring true one hundred years later!
