


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HOOTENANNY WATCH PARTY

A MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBINIC INTERN

Looking to the Horizon: Mission, Vision, and Our Sacred Future



In Jewish tradition, daily gratitude is about noticing the small things. What some may call "הכרת הטוב" hakarat hatov, the recognition or calling out of goodness. Gratitude does not demand big fireworks or grand displays of piety. Often, gratitude comes in a simple thank you, a shared smile, or a small act of kindness that lingers in someone's heart long after the moment has passed.

One of the places I have learned lessons of light and gratitude most clearly was volunteering to lead the Hebrew Union College's Soup Kitchen. Every Monday, people from many walks of life came through the doors, looking not only for food and clothing, but also for warmth, dignity, and a sense of community. I remember one guest in particular. He would always come in, sit down at the same table, and ask for a hot cup of coffee. But not just coffee. He had a very particular order: a splash of milk, four packets of sugar, stirred just so.

At first, I admit I thought it was just his small quirk. But after a few weeks, I found myself preparing his coffee for him

before he even asked. In each small exchange, I learned that the coffee was not the point of my relationship with our guests.

Our Soup Kitchen's

drink selection reminded guests every time they visited our community that they are known and that some volunteer cares enough to remember who they are. Despite living on the streets of Manhattan, they were not invisible.

For one particular guest named Angel, his day was transformed by the experience of having his coffee order remembered. What could have been routine - pouring people coffee and handing out bagged meals - instead became a special practice of seeing others and being seen myself. Adding a splash of milk and four packets of sugar to Angel's cup of coffee made my understanding of hospitality, human dignity, and community service changed forever.

Transformation is not only personal. It is communal. Every act of kindness plants a seed that changes the soil of our community. After I remembered one guest's coffee order, I began to remember others.

At Beth Emeth, when we come together for service projects, like the Soup Kitchen or visiting the sick, we are not only meeting communal needs, we are reshaping the whole culture of our congregation.

Each time we serve others with gratitude, we plant seeds of light within our broader community. When we see and honor the humanity of another person, even in something as small as remembering how someone takes their coffee, we are sowing seeds

> of light that will eventually fill our community with joy.

May gratitude, and the Jewish practice of "הכרת הטוב" hakarat hatov, acknowledging the good in our

lives, open our hearts to all of the beautiful blessings around us. May we together reap a bountiful harvest of joy and light this season, becoming a community of individuals transformed by the simple, sacred act of seeing one another, one cup of coffee (or tea) at a time.

As we enter the season of Chanukah, these words of Rabbi Sacks remind us that gratitude is more than a feeling—it is a foundation for how we live our lives. When we begin with gratitude, every other virtue flows from it: kindness, compassion, generosity, and hope.

A few years ago during Chanukah, I found myself standing in the kitchen surrounded by wrapping paper, cookie crumbs, and children debating whether eight nights of gifts meant eight big presents or one "real" one and seven "token" ones. As I looked around at the joyful chaos—half-eaten latkes, a candle leaning sideways in the menorah, and laughter echoing through the house—I suddenly realized: this is exactly what gratitude looks like. It's not neat or perfect. It's laughter, togetherness, and the kind of beautiful mess that reminds us how lucky we are to have people who fill our homes with light.

The story of Chanukah is itself a story of gratitude. Faced with scarcity, our ancestors could have turned away in despair. Instead, they chose to give thanks for what they had—to light the menorah with a single jar of oil—and to trust that their faith would carry them forward. That simple act of courage and gratitude became the spark for a miracle still celebrated thousands of years later.

In our community at Congregation Beth Emeth, I see gratitude lived out daily. I see it in our clergy, who give of themselves with wisdom and care. I see it in our staff, who dedicate their talents to ensuring our congregation thrives. I see it in our volunteers, whose energy and commitment light the way for others. And I see it in all of you—our members—whose participation, kindness, and support make Beth Emeth a true home.

As your president, I am deeply grateful for the honor of serving you. Each gathering, each program, and each prayer service reminds me that we are more than a congregation—we are a family, bound together by shared tradition, values, and a vision for the future. Gratitude calls us to see not only what we have received, but also what we are called to give.

This Chanukah, may we each find ways to let gratitude guide us. May the menorah's light remind us that even the smallest flame of thanks can illuminate the darkest night. And may we carry that light into the year ahead, building a community rooted in gratitude, joy, and hope.


BROTHERHOOD WINS SPECIAL AWARD

Capital Region Yom HaShoah Candle Project: A Tradition of Remembrance and Community

For nearly four decades, the Capital Region Yom HaShoah Candle Distribution Project has ensured that close to 2,000 Jewish households annually receive a yellow candle to light on Holocaust Remembrance Day.

This powerful symbol affirms the communal vow: "We will never forget." Sustained by volunteers from Brotherhoods and Men's Clubs across the region, it has grown into a vital tradition that educates and unites generations.

The project began in the late 1980s when Brotherhood leaders realized the collective power of working together, ensuring every Jewish home could participate in honoring the six million lives lost. Today, this highly coordinated, grassroots effort distributes nearly 2,000 candles across four counties using roughly 100 delivery routes. The annual operation relies on over 80 volunteers



for delivery and countless others for data management, logistics, and a communal Assembly Night. This massive effort relies entirely on the cooperation and trust of multiple congregations working as one.

The project demonstrated remarkable resilience during the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent logistical hurdles, quickly pivoting to implement "touchless" deliveries and finding creative solutions to distribution challenges. This flexibility has proven that adaptability keeps the flame alive.

In Summer 2025, the project was recognized nationally when the Men of Reform Judaism (MRJ) presented it with the prestigious J. Robert Arkbush Award for outstanding social action/interfaith programming.

The project continues its sacred commitment, prioritizing memory and community over fundraising. It is about standing together as one Jewish community to say: "Never Forget."

WHO WANTS TO BE A MINYAN-AIRE?

No, it's not a television program, and you can't ask the audience for help or phone a friend. By joining our group you are extending a lifeline to someone else in need.

With a congregation the size of Beth Emeth, it is often difficult for our two clergy to attend all of the life cycle events. One in particular is the ability to have a minyan for someone who has suffered a loss to say Mourner's Kaddish during Shiva.

Come join the minyanaires and learn how to conduct a Shiva service when our clergy are stretched too thin. I promise it will be a rewarding experience.






ANNOUNCING THE ANNUAL WISLEY DUPICHE TURKEY GIVEAWAY

Thanksgiving 100 years ago From Rabbi Emeritus Scott Shpeen

Thursday, November 26, 1925, was a momentous day for Congregation Beth Emeth. As an active part of the interfaith/interreligious community of the Capital Region, Beth Emeth participated in the ANNUAL UNION THANKSGIVING SERVICE that was held that year at 11:00 am at the UNITY CHURCH in Albany. Rabbi Ransom delivered the sermon, as well as the Thanksgiving proclamation.

What is also most poignant is the prayer for THANKFULNESS that appeared on the Bulletin cover for a special THANKSGIVING BULLETIN published that year and how its message still resonates and rings true yet one hundred years later!

Ever since the Pilgrims Fathers
Crossed Atlantic's stormy sea,
For the wilderness of New England
In the cause of liberty,
We have ever had a reason
To be thankful to the God,
Who has showered down His blessings
On this favored bit of sod.

Thankful that we have established
Freedom as the greatest goal,
Thereby known by other nations
As the nation with a soul.
As the land that broke the power
And the tyranny of might,
As the land that rescued mankind
As the land that flashed the light.

In this time of celebration,
In our humbleness we pray
Forth our thanks to God Almighty
On this glad Thanksgiving Day

A few weeks later, as noted in an article that appeared in the local press, Rabbi Ranson celebrated his 34th birthday on December 10.

It is most interesting to note that his birthday (not a special milestone year) was seen as significant enough to be featured in the newspaper.




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
